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THE FORTIETH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BRITISH PROTESTANT SCHOOL

IN CONNEXION WITH ST. GEORGE'S CHAPEL

AND THE RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

AT THE

GENERAL MEETING OF SUBSCRIBERS,

HELD AT THE SCHOOL-HOUSE,

Lisbon, 7th May, 1877

In the absence of H. B. Consul, George Brackenbury, Esq., President of the Institution, the Rev. T. Godfrey P. Pope took the chair, and the books and papers of the Institution, including the Treasurer's accounts duly audited, being laid before the meeting, the Secretary read the following report from the Managing Committee for the year 1876.

Report

In accordance with Rule 10, the Managing Committee of the British Protestant School in connexion with St. George's Chapel have the pleasure of presenting to the Subscribers of the Institution a Report of the proceedings of the past year and statement of the finances.

Your Committee are glad to say that through the

kindness of the Rev. L. S. Tugwell of London, they have been enabled to secure to this Institution the services of a duly qualified master, in the person of Mr. Bruce, who was introduced to them by Mr. Ed. Daniels, Principal of the Battersea Training College. Mr. Bruce arrived here with his wife in May ult.° shortly before the departure of Mr. Pitman the late master, and has since had charge of the School. The testimonials he holds from his previous employers are fully borne out by your Committee's experience of his management of the School for the last twelve months.

The children admitted into the School during the past year have been 10, and 17 have left. Since the beginning of the present year, 8 more have been admitted, so that the total number on the School Register now is 33. Of this number, 22 are boarders; i. e. 12 girls and 10 boys; the remaining 11 being

day-scholars.

The average daily attendance for the past year was 17 for boarders, and 12 for day scholars, making a total of 29, which, when compared with the previous year, shows a decrease of 14 for boarders, an increase of 4 for day scholars. The decrease in the attendance of boarders is accounted for by the number of children who left School throughout the year, and whereas our last report closed with 25 boarders, the present one closes with 22 only, of which 4 were admitted this year.

The progress of the children continues to be very satisfactory, your Committee are also pleased to be able to state that that their health has been very good, and with the exception of a rather serious fall which one of the boys had, and a few minor ailments, to all of which Dr. Lilburne kindly attended, they

have nothing of moment to notice.

Your Committee regret that the Treasurer's accounts for 1876 show a deficit of Rs. 51:460, although the year was begun with a balance on hand of Rs. 93:510. This unfavorable result is accounted for partly by the reduced number of boarders in the school. The payment from these in 1876 was only Rs. 529:475. In 1875 it was Rs. 1;139:675, or more Rs. 610:200. The reduction in llouse expenses, the account of which in 1875 was Rs. 1:818:920, and in 1876 Rs. 1;335:180, is only Rs. 483:740. Consequently the nett account in 1876, as compared with 1875, is augmented by Rs. 126:460. Besides this difference in House expenses, sundry payments in 1876 for repairs, eultery, erockery, and passage money of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce, have contributed to produce the deficit. In eonelusion, your Committee are sorry to have to reeord the death of Mr. James Gartand, who was one of their members, and the loss of whose services in connexion with this Institution they deeply regret.

Proposed by Mr. Watts J. Garland, and seconded by Mr. John S. Howorth, that in accordance with Rule 9, Mr. Mac Nicoll, Treasurer, and Mr. Albert H. Mascarenhas, Secretary, be re-elected to their former posts in the Managing Committee.

A vote of thanks to the Ladies' Committee for their

kind attention to the well-being of the School, was proposed by Mr. Pope, and unanimously carried.

The cordial tranks of the meeting were by acclamation given to the Rev. T. Godfrey P. Pope for his

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able conduct in the chair.

GENERAL RULES

OF THE

BRITISH PROTESTANT SCHOOL

LISBON

(as amended at the General Meeting of subscribers held March 23, -1874.)

Name

1 That the Institution be designated "The British Protestant School in connexion with St. George's Episcopal Chapel."

Design

2 That the design of this Institution be to educate children of hoth sexes, being British subjects; to train them in babits of industry and frugality; to instil into their youthful minds the principles of the Christian religion; to qualify them by education to fill useful stations in life; and, when practicable, to place them in situations where they will be at a distance from temptation, and bave the means of gaining an honest livelihood.

Government

3 That this Institution be under the management of a President, the resident British Chaplain for the time being, and Seven Subscribers, who shall form a Committee of nine members, their services being gratuitous; that the British Envoy for the time being at the Court of Lisbon be requested to be Patron; that her Britannic Majesty's Chief Consular agent at Lisbon, also for the time being, be Vice-Patron and President; and that the Committee of the British Protestant Episcopal Church Establishment of Lisbon for the time being, appointed in conformity with the act of Parliament and registered at the Consulate office, be the Trustees of the Institution.

General meetings

4. That the General Meeting of the Subscribers be

beld yearly in February or March.

5. That it be the duty of the Secretary to convene a Special General Meeting, on receiving a requistion to do so, signed by at least five Subscribers,—or by three Subscribers, one of whom must be a member of the Committee.

6. That the General Meetings he composed of British Subjects, resident in Lisbon, who are annual subscribers, of at least three mil réis, and have paid nine mil réis, towards the support of the Institution. No General Meeting to be held of which the said Subscribers have not had a week's notice: and that a Chairman be elected from the Subscribers present, when the President cannot attend.

7. That the Rules of this Institution may only be altered, or revoked, at any General, or Special General Meeting providing specific mention be made of the proposed alterations, in the notice convening the same, in accordance with the preceding

Rule.

8. That no husiness be transacted at any Special General Meeting, except that for which it has been convened, and that such business be specified in the

notices convening the same.

9. That the Committee be annually elected from and by the Subscribers at the General Meeting in February or March; that the two seniors of the seven elective members retire annually, but be open to re-election by the General Meeting at which their retirement is reported; that the medical attendant, if a Protestant, be requested to serve upon the Committee as one of the seven elective members; that a list of the names of the Managing Committee, and Ladies' Committee be printed with each annual report, in the same order as entered upon the minutes when elected, and that all references to Seniority contained in these Rules be regulated by that list.

10. That a report of the proceedings of the preceding year, and a statement of the finances of the Institution be laid before the Committee, at their Meeting in February, for approval, previous to their being presen-

ted to the General Meeting.

11. That all questions at General Meetings be decided by a majorlity of Subscribers present; and that in cases of equality of votes, the President or Chair-

man have a casting vote.

12. That in the absence of the President, a Chairman for the day shall be chosen from the members present, and that the Committee have power to make up any deficiency in their number that may occur between the days of annual election. That they also be empowered to appoint a Committee of four Ladies to superintend the domestic arrangements of the School, in conjunction with the wife of the Chaplain for the time being, who shall be invited to be a permanent member of the Committee, the senior elective member of which shall retire annually, being open however to re-election, as in the Managing Committee.

13. That the Committee meet monthly, or oftener when necessary, for the purpose of conducting the affairs of the Institution; and that three be a quorum. That three days notice he given of all Committee Meetings, unless specially prorogued at the close of one meeting for an earlier day.

14. That every member of the Committee, who has not attended the Meeting for twelve successive months.

be considered as having resigned.

15. That the Ladies' Committee bave the management of the Clothing fund, Library, household linen and all accounts relating thereto, which are to be balanced and included in the Treasurer's accounts at the end of each year. That the other business of the Institution not specially provided for in these Rules, as well as the offices of Treasurer and Secretary be distributed amongst the Seven Elective members of the Committee. — That the Committee bave the appointment to, and removal from all such offices, as also that of the Medical Attendant, School Master, Mistress, and all the Servants of the Institution.

16. That the Treasurer receive all monies belonging to the Institution, and dispose of the same as

the Committee may direct.

17. That the Secretary take minutes of the proceedings of all General and Committee Meetings; that he summon the Committee, and attend to such general husiness of the Institution, as may not be specially distributed to other members of the Committee. That the President, or Chairman for the time being, be empowered to summon either a General, or Committee Meeting in default of the Secretary.

18. That the Medical Attendant be requested to attend the children professionally in the Institution as often as needful, and to report the state of the

children's health in a hook kept for the purpose.

19. That the Committee, at their first Meeting in January, nominate two Auditors of accounts, one to be chosen from the Committee, and one from the Subscribers; and that the accounts he audited before

the annual General Meeting.

20. That the children eligible for gratuitous admission into the School he British subjects recognized by Consular certificate; but parents of children, whose means will admit of it, will be expected to contribute monthly to the support of the Establishment, such sums as the Committee consider they can afford. That the children whose Parents desire to pay for their education as day Scholars, he admitted on payment of a monthly Sum, to be fixed by the Committee.

21. That the Committee have power to admit children of foreign parents, on receipt of a monthly or annual payment from the parents or friends of such children; the amount to be left to the decision of the Committee; and that all practicable preference he shewn to children of English mothers married to foreigners. That no such children he admitted without some responsible person engaging to take charge of them when required to be removed from the School.

22. That the Committee dimiss from the Institution any child whose society they consider will be injurious to the other children, as also such children as do not return to School at the end of the vacations or at the expiration of any special leave of absence, unless explanations sactisfactory to the Committee are given by the respective parents or friends.

23. That all children admitted into the Institution shall attend Divine Service every Sabbath when practicable, at the British Protestant Church; and that the religious instruction be in conformity with the

precepts and doctrines of the Church of England.

24. That the Committee do not admit any child until assured that rule 23 has been fully explained to the parents or friends of the candidate for such admission, and that the parents or friends of all such children admitted into the School be furnished with a printed resume of the General and Committee Rules necessary for their information and guidance.

25. That the resident British Chaplain for the time being, be requested to superintend, subject to the control of the Committee, the education of the children. That the Subscribers in general he invited to join in a system by which they may each in turn take part in the inspection of the School as periodical visiters; and that a book, or printed forms, be provided, in which such visiters may write any remarks or suggestions they may desire to make to the

Committee.

26. That the School Master or Mistress do not relinquish their situations in the School without giving at least six months' notice; or, failing to do so, that thay forfeit six months' salary.

27. That all questions at Meetings of the Committee he decided by a majority of members present; and that in cases of equality of votes, the President

or Chairman have a casting vote.

28. That the number of children to be received into this Institution be determined by the Committee, and that application for the admission of children be made personally at the Monthly Meetting, or at any other time, to such member of the Committee as may be charged with the duty of receiving and investigating the applications.

Admission of Children

29. That no child be admitted into the School under the age of five years, nor exceeding that of nine for Boys, and ten for Girls: and that each caudidate for admission be provided with a certificate of baptism, and a declaration made whether such child has had, small-pox, hooping-cough, measles, and been vaccinated; also with a certificate of having undergone examination by the Medical Attendant of the Institution. In extraordinary cases the Committee have power to depart from the strict observance of this Rule.

School Regulations

30. That each day be commenced and concluded

with praver.

31. That the Sabbath be made as much as possible a day of devotion and rest, and that the intervals not engaged in public worship be devoted to the reading and explanation of the Scriptures. -That Sunday Classes be promoted as much as possible, and that the Committee make such regulations as may appear calculated to encourage the attendance of those who, not belonging to the School, are like-

ly to derive benefit from such instruction.

32. That no Book be admitted into the School-house until it has been examined by the visiting Clergyman and been approved by him or by the Committee; that the general daily routine of the Institution, School hours, lessons, etc. be approved by the committee, and entered in a book to be kept for that purpose; the system of education followed in the School being that of a plain English one, embracing reading, writing, arithmetic, plain needlework and ironing; and that the elder children be taught the Portuguese

language. That a copy of the General routine be framed and placed in the Schoolhouse, signed by the

Secretary.

33. That the Chaplain be requested to examine the children previous to the Midsummer and Christmas holidays, and to lay a written report of their progress before the next General Meetting.—At the Christmas examination, prizes shall be distributed to the most deserving children.

34. That independent of the above examinations, the Chaplain he requested to catechise the children upon the lessons they learn, as often as he may judge

requisite.

35. That no child be allowed to leave the School without a written authorisation signed by the Secretary, or in his absence hy some other member of the Committee, except in case of a child's illness, when it must be signed by the Medical Attendant. — That the Master or Mistress of the School keep a Diary containing entries of the admission, temporary absence, return and removal of Children, with such other matters as the Committee may direct in addition to the class-book and verbal report at each monthly meeting, in order that the Committee may be fully informed of all circumstances connected with the management of the Institution, the conduct of the Children, their progress in education, etc.

36. That no child having gone home ill, or visited its friends in case of their illness, be permitted to return to the School, until the Medical Attendant has ascertained that it can do so without danger of infection, and given a written declaration to that effect.

37. That upon serious illness appearing in the School, the Master or Mistress immediately give notice thereof to the Secretary and Medical Attendant.

38. That the Library of useful and entertaining books be for the use of the children, which their friends also out of the School, may have the privilege of reading, on application to Ladies' Committee.

Removal of Children

39. That boys having attained the age of 14 years, and girls the age of 15 years, be considered as having completed the term of their education, and be subject to removal; but in extraordinary cases, upon application from the parents or friends, the Committee have power to depart from the strict observance of this rule.

this rule.

40. That no child educated at this Institution, be removed from it, until it has been examined by the Committee; and if its general conduct has been good, and its progress in learning satisfactory, it shall receive a certificate in its favor, signed by the President or Chairman. That each child, about to leave the school, shall receive a Bible and a Prayer-book.

COMMITTEE REGULATIONS

Dress for children. To be simple and uniform, as provided in the Committee minutes of June 2 — 1847.

and Dec. 5-1856.

Mousehold Linen. Accounts to be kept by Ladies' Committee are understood to include everything required to be made of linen, cotton, wool etc. An inventory to be kept of the principal articles, such as blankets, sheets, tablecloths towels, etc. The inventory to be examined at least once a year, when all needful renewals shall be made, in order to avoid an accumulation of expense by general renewals at long intervals.

Children's work. The proceeds of children's work to appear separately in the yearly accounts kept by the Ladies' Committiee, although it may be applied

to the purchase of cottons, tapes etc. as the Ladies may direct. The Ladies will regulate from time to time the tariff of charges for children's work, take such steps as may be necessary to keep them supplied with work, and see that the girls are taught ironing and other domestic duties.

Prizes for children's work. The Ladies' committee will provide two yearly prizes for needlework, and one for knitting, to be distributed with the other prizes according to rule 53. The first prize, however, is not to be given twice to the same child; but rather to be held as an incentive to all the girls, who ought to look forward to its attainment as soon as they have perfected themselves in needlework, ironing, etc.

situations for the girls. To the Ladies' Comnittee more especially belongs the duty of providing, as far as practicable, suitable situations for those girls who require them when about to leave the school.

meetings of Ladies' Committee. That the Ladies' Committee meet monthly the last Friday in each month at 12 o'clock without further notice.

Nisiting of Ladies' Committee, That each lady of the Committee visit the school in turn on at least one morning in the month from 10 to 12 o'clock, the day or days to be chosen for the ensuing month at each meeting of the Ladies' Committee. During such visits, the visitor will hear lessons said to the Master and Mistress, sometimes take a class herself when disposed to do so, take an account of needlework done during the week, provide needle-work for the following week, attend to the changing of books in the circulating library, and sign her name as a a visitor in a book kept for the purpose. In case any lady is prevented attending on her day of visiting,

she should ask one of the other ladies to take her

place.

the secretary and treasurer. That the secretary and treasurer of the Clothing and Library funds be only required to attend as a weekly visitor when there are five Fridays in the month; that she receive the library subscriptions collected by each lady on their day of meeting: that she superintend the whole of the domestic affairs of the school; that she be referred to in all cases of difficulty of internal management, and illness of the children.

Report etc. to Managing Committee. Should the Ladies' committee have anything to report or suggest at the end of each month, they will use their discretion in either writing to the secretary, or submitting the minutes of their proceedings, containing such report, suggestions, etc. to the Committee meet-

ing held at the beginning of each month.

Appointment of ladies' Committee. It is desirable the election of the new member of the Ladies' Committee take place at the first Committee meeting in each year, in order that no delay may arise in the collection of subscriptions for the library and clothing Funds, should the Ladies' have to make any change in the appointment of Treasurer to their Committee.
